A message from Nichole Battle, Chief Executive Officer and Stephanie Shack, GEDCO Board President.

This year has been marked by significant change, growth, reflection, and hope.

In FY25, GEDCO began the process of re-launching our five-year strategic plan. Our board, staff, and stakeholders have collaboratively reimagined GEDCO's mission and programs, and we eagerly anticipate sharing the new plan in the Fall.

We have also concentrated on fortifying the organization by investing in staff, improving our infrastructure, and enhancing our service delivery. Thanks to the generosity of a philanthropist, we are proud to have established GEDCO's first-ever endowment, a crucial step in securing our future.

Additionally, this year GEDCO has diligently advocated for policies that improve the lives of those we serve. Through committee involvement, partnerships with national nonprofits, and testimony at various hearings, we have continued to be a voice for older adults, affordable housing, and other vulnerable populations in our community.

In July 2024, GEDCO hosted an open house and ribbon cutting at Ascension Homes, to welcome back our residents after a comprehensive renovation project. Last updated in 1988, Ascension Homes underwent a full overhaul to ensure its continued sustainability as a group home for individuals with chronic mental illness. Along similar lines, GEDCO focused much of its energy in FY25 on providing mental health support for our residents and resources to our Community Hub visitors, ranging from basic needs such as food and toiletries to the distribution of over 500 Chromebooks. GEDCO prides itself on stepping up whenever we can help, and if do not have the resources, we assist our community in finding them.

This year also brought the loss of several key individuals who were integral to GEDCO, Stadium Place, and the broader community. We mourn the passing of Dr. Melinda Fitting, our dedicated Secretary; Ms. Pat Thompson, a founder of CARES and Stadium Place resident; Mr. Wesley Aydlett, a Stadium Place board member and resident; and former Councilwoman Mary Pat Clarke. We also said goodbye to three founding community partners—St. Mary of the Assumption, Blessed Sacrament, and St. Pius X. Despite these losses, we are grateful for the unwavering support of friends and partners who continue to help us build compassionate communities in Baltimore. In these challenging times, we remain hopeful, guided by the belief that "God takes care of those who are doing His work." For 34 years, we have felt God's guidance and strength, and we are thankful for the leaders who paved the way for us to be here, especially as our services are needed more than ever.

As we reflect on the progress made in FY25, we are proud of our accomplishments and excited about the positive impact we will continue to have in FY26. Thank you for your ongoing support and faith in our mission. On behalf of our staff, board, members, volunteers, and the thousands of individuals we served in FY25, we are deeply grateful to you.

We work with our program participants to help them envision a positive future for themselves by assisting them with setting goals, and then we either provide directly or link them with the necessary resources they need to accomplish their goals. GEDCO serves people who have faced daunting obstacles and/or cycled in and out of crises. We are absolutely committed to helping them achieve greater stability and self-reliance, and our track record attests to the success of our approach.

Gallagher Mansion: Renovated, historic 1855 mansion with 41 one-bedroom apartments that has housed GEDCO residents since 1996.

Stadium Place: Established in 1999, a mixed income retirement community on the site of the former Memorial Stadium, with apartments for 450 older adults including: Venable Apartments I & II, Ednor Apartments I & II, Zen Apartments, and Heritage Run

Harford House: Renovated in 1994, for 26 men.

Micah House: Renovated in 1998, for 33 men and women




Epiphany House: Renovated in 1985, a renovated antebellum hotel with 33 efficiency apartments.

Consolidated Statement of Activities (GEDCO and Senior Network of North Baltimore) For FY25





Highlights in FY25









The following are highlights of FY25 (April 1, 2024, through March 31, 2025):

- 34 years of providing housing and services in North Baltimore
- Real Estate Development renovated Ascension Homes and preserved
 20 units of housing for older adults with disabilities
- Assisted York Road Partnership in securing \$550,000 in BRNI Funds for projects along the York Road Corridor
- GEDCO was awarded the HUD 202 funds for Elkader Way (a project of developing affordable housing for 93 Older Adults at Stadium Place) and \$1MM in Congressional funding.
- Distributed 515 Chromebooks to Older Adult residents and low-income individuals in the community. The Chromebook distribution was part of a partnership with the Enoch Pratt Library.
- Provided technology training to over 583 individuals in the community and GEDCO residents.
- Provided 4,679 unique households food assistance impacting 2,763 children and 192 homeless individuals.
- 378 individuals received job assistance with 42 jobs secured.
- 8 Homeless Services residents moved out to independent living, including 7 who with the assistance of staff secured section 8 housing and 1 moved into GEDCO Older Adult Housing.
- GEDCO focused on mental health with the expansion of the Mindfulness Elder Shine Program for Older Adult residents.
- GEDCO launched a new website and donor database.

GEDCO WORKS IN 5 GENERAL AREAS TO ACHIEVE OUR MISSION WITH THE SUPPORT OF RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT AND MARKETING.

















OLDER ADULT SERVICES

GEDCO provides housing and supportive services for more than 520 older adults at Stadium Place, the Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Senior Housing at Gallagher Mansion, and Epiphany House. We offer a wide variety of activities and services through the Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Senior Center-Senior Network of North Baltimore.

In FY25, the older adult area achieved the following milestones:

- GEDCO staff assisted residents in planning and implementing a variety of activities to increase engagement and reduce social isolation.
- GEDCO Service Coordinators provided information and resources for 92% of residents, including food distribution, benefit applications, wellness checks, health promotion information and other services.
- GEDCO staff coordinated cooking, crafts, dancing, exercise programs, book clubs, and many more classes to keep Older Adults active and engaged.
- Special programs for residents at Stadium Place included a fish fry fundraising event, gospel fest, Women's tea, Valentine's Ball and Welcome to the New Year party, just to name a few of the many events.
- Partners such as Gilchrist have been presenting monthly programs related to end-of-life issues in all buildings at Stadium Place.



OLDER ADULTS CONTINUED

- Students from Morgan State University, Notre Dame University, Johns Hopkins University, Loyola University and University of Maryland provided health programming at our various Older Adult communities.
- GBMC provided nurses and health coaches to provide hypertension education and blood pressure checks.
- Alzheimer's Association has provided workshops at our various Older Adult buildings.
- Aging 360 program piloted at Stadium Place for Older Adults with support from Enterprise communities.

GEDCO'S SENIOR CENTER-SENIOR NETWORK OF NORTH BALTIMORE

- Senior Network of North Baltimore (SNNB) which is GEDCO's Senior Center provided over 1,000 Older Adults in the North Baltimore community with resources and activities
- Raised more than \$1,000 through Gertrude's annual fundraiser
- 18+ attendees now participate in Monday Mindfulness Sessions, up from 3 attendees in 2020.
- Annual Farmers Market coupon giveaway benefits over 280 seniors.
- Travel programs have included trips to destinations such as Washington, DC; Maine; Vermont; and more.
- SNNB provides many virtual and in-person activities including exercise classes, bridge club, book club, health information programs, health information programs and legal assistance.



COMMUNITY SERVICES



GEDCO operates the CARES program where we provide food and emergency support for more than 4,400 individuals annually. CARES helps people in crisis avoid evictions and utility cut-offs, pay for costly prescriptions medications, have food security, and access healthy food choices through the food pantry. CARES also provides employment services like creation of a resume, interview practice and business clothing to help individuals secure employment and become a self-sufficient member of our community.

In FY25, CARES achieved the following milestones:

- 4,885 unique households received food assistance impacting the lives of 2,763 children and 192 homeless community members.
- More than 378 individuals received job assistance with 46 jobs secured.
- GEDCO, in partnership with the Mayor's Office of Employment Development held 3 job fairs at the GEDCO Community Hub.
- 4,023 Farmers Market coupons were given out for the 32nd Street Farmers Market and Loyola's Govanstowne Farmers Market.
- 2,013 visitors to GEDCO Community Hub seeking emergency financial assistance as well as other assistance such as baby products, toiletries, adult diapers, household goods, and other basic essentials.
- \$2,927 was distributed for prescription assistance to 54 individuals.



COMMUNITY SERVICES CONTINUED

- \$113,504 was distributed to 268 families for eviction prevention.
- \$35,204 was distributed to 135 individuals for utility assistance.
- Assisted 149 households to submit applications for funding from the Office of Home Energy Program (OHEP) for which GEDCO has a partnership and can submit applications directly.
- Helped 206 families apply for the Maryland Fuel Fund.
- Assisted 206 people with their water bills
- 31,892 pounds for food was received from the Maryland Food Bank.
- 328 volunteers donated 1,531 hours to CARES.
- In partnership with MedStar Good Samaritan GEDCO continued to provide medical screenings which included blood pressure checks and resources for health. They also educate our neighbors about the benefits of eating healthily as well as providing educational and gifts for visitors to the Community Hub.
- In partnership with GBMC, GEDCO started a program to register community members with services provided at home.
- Christ Child Society brings in children books each month aligned with the holiday and or season.



HOMELESS AND SUPPORTIVE SERVICES

GEDCO provides housing and supportive services for 60 individuals who have experienced homelessness and 70 individuals with chronic mental illness. Our homeless and supportive services consist of Harford House, Micah House, and Ascension Homes.

In FY25, Homeless and Supportive Services achieved the following milestones:

- 100% of the residents have access to food at both programs.
- GEDCO staff assisted more than 75% of residents in applying for benefit programs and accessing various health resources including psychiatric rehabilitation programs
- Staff assisted 5 residents secure jobs. A Harford House resident was promoted to maintenance supervisor on his job.
- 7 residents moved out to Section 8 housing and 1 moved into GEDCO Older Adult and Supportive Services housing.
- 50% of residents participate in substance abuse treatment.
- 75% of the residents participated in Volunteerism.
- Mount Zion Methodist Church donated activity packets to Harford House and Faith Presbyterian Jimmy John Sub night at Harford House.









REAL ESTATE DEVELOPMENT AND PROPERTY MANAGEMENT

GEDCO undertakes real estate development activities in response to community needs and opportunities. We are also collaborating with other neighborhood groups and nonprofit organizations to advance their affordable housing and community development goals.

In FY25, Real Estate and Property Management Services Achieved the following milestones:

- Real Estate Development renovated Ascension Homes and preserved 20 units of housing for older adults with disabilities
- Awarded HUD 202 funds for Elkader Way and \$1MM in Congressional Funding
- Assisted York Road partners in securing \$550,000 in BRNI Funds for projects along the York Road Corridor
- In the predevelopment phase for renovating 3 homes for homeownership in the Coldstream Homestead Montebello community.
- Completed the renovation of Ascension Homes (the preservation of affordable housing for Older Adults with disabilities) and was able to move the residents back into their housing.
- GEDCO hired staff for GHEM Community Management which included Tracy N. Harris-Peters-Property Manager, Maria Wright-Assistant Property Manager, and Jeffrey D. Knox Sr., Maintenance Supervisor.



RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT AND MARKETING

GEDCO's Resource Development area is responsible for bringing in funding for GEDCO's Operations as well as managing volunteers and relationships with GEDCO's 56 Member Organizations. The department is also responsible for the marketing of the organization.

In FY25, Resource Development and Marketing achieved the following milestones:

- Distributed over 515 Chromebook to Older Adults and low-income individuals.
- Coordinated the training of over 583 individuals.
- Secured a \$2 million Open Yield Opportunity grant in March 2024. Funds were used to cover debt, program expenses and to set up an endowment fund to ensure GEDCO 's future.
- Signed up Alzheimer's and Kingdom Worship as Member Organizations.
- Developed and rolled out a new web site.
- Developed and rolled out a new database.
- Coordinated the Holiday Cheer Program which provided holiday meals and gifts for low-income residents at Epiphany House, Gallagher Mansion, Ascension Homes, Harford House, and Micah House.
- The Thanksgiving Tribute and Golf Tournament were sponsored as part of GEDCO's fundraising efforts.
- A training video for CARES was developed as well as an updated volunteer training manual.
